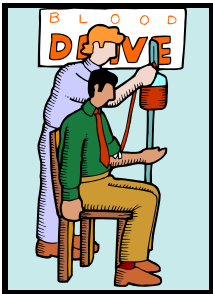

SEA SALT – DON'T BE FOOLED!



The July issue of Tuft's University Health & Nutrition Newsletter had some very useful information to clarify the value of the now popular sea salt, touted by many to be better than regular iodized table salt. According to an American Heart Association survey, "61% of Americans erroneously think that sea salt is a healthier, lower-sodium alternative to regular salt." Actually, sea salt is the same sodium content, simply harvested from seawater rather than mines. More confusion surrounds that notion that it is the salt shaker that is the problem when it comes to adding salt to our diets. Instead most dietary sodium comes from that in processed foods. (e.g. frozen dinners, canned soups - check labels!) New guidelines now recommend 1,500 mg. of sodium (salt) daily rather than the old standard of 2,400 mg – all related to the increased efforts to lower blood pressures and promote healthier hearts.

Other misconceptions in the survey found that although over three fourths surveyed stated wine was good for the heart, not even one-third knew that the recommended daily limits are two alcoholic drinks for men and one for women.

The New Roman Missal

Why do we have to change the words we use in the Mass?

The Roman Missal (the prayer book we use for Mass) is originally written in Latin. Shortly after the Second Vatican Council we received the first edition of the English translation of the Roman Missal, and then in 1985, there was a second translation, but the changes were very minor and many did not even really notice the changes. In 2000, Pope John Paul II presented the Roman Catholic Church the third edition of the Roman Missal in Latin. There were some minor modifications to the Latin text, along with the addition of some new prayers for recently canonized saints. Thus, a new translation was needed. Then shortly after the promulgation of the new Latin text, Pope John Paul II promulgated a new set of guidelines which directs the translation process of the Roman Missal into vernacular languages. These guidelines were different than the 1969 guidelines that Pope Paul VI prepared for the first and second translations of the Roman Missal; thus, the third edition of the Roman Missal would be translated under different principles than the original translations. Some of the new principles include:

- 1) The translations should be a more literal translation, reflecting the linguistic and grammatical style of the Latin text.
- 2) The translations should make even clearer biblical references so that the Bible stands out more clearly in our liturgical prayers.
- 3) The language in the liturgy should be of a heightened nature to reflect that what we celebrate in the liturgy is an important act of worship.

It is for these reasons that we are receiving a new translation that may appear to have a number of significant changes to the text.
